20世紀はアメリカの世紀と呼ばれる。移民の急増による国家の膨張、二度にわたる大戦での勝利、大量生産と消費による空前の繁栄、科学技術の驚異的な進歩、冷戦を経て唯一の超大国として世界に君臨 ——。

そして、21世紀に入りおよそ 10年。混迷の時代にあって、自身にさまざまな矛盾や危機をはらみながらも、アメリカは依然、エネルギッシュな力にあふれ、次の世界の未来図を描き続けている。太平洋の反対側に生きるわれわれも、今後の時代を占ううえで、アメリカの動向に注目しないわけにはいかないであろう。

しかし、アメリカの活力は、冒頭にあげた教科書的な表現だけで語りきれるものではない。むしろ、一般のアメリカ人たちの生活にこそその活力は宿り、新しい時代の胎動となっていくのではないか。本書がとりあげたのは、そうした一般アメリカ人の日常に垣間見られる、新たな時代の息吹である。

本書の英文を執筆した Braven Smillie 氏は、カリフォルニア州サンディエゴ市 出身の文筆家で、多年にわたり日本とアメリカを行き来している。長く AP 通信の 記者をつとめ、今回もその鋭敏なジャーナリスト感覚で、凡百の書き手なら見過ご してしまうような事象から、アメリカの現在を活写してみせてくれた。読者はその 英文から、アメリカの明日を読みとることだろう。

Smillie 氏の文章は、平明にして洒脱。日本人大学生が模範とするにふさわしい 英文である。諸君は内容を楽しみつつも、英文の妙も味わってもらいたい。また、 自分でもそうした表現を使えるように、周到な練習問題も用意した。さらに、やは り Smillie 氏が構成したダイアローグによる聴き取り練習で、音声面でのコミュニ ケーション能力も育成されるよう配慮した。

本書を十二分に活用し、変化のさなかにあるアメリカを知り、あわせて英語力の向上に役立ててもらえるよう、著者のひとりとして願っている。

Every year in America, groups of men, young and old, put on uniforms and gather in pre-arranged locations — usually an open field with rolling hills, or a forest clearing. They divide into two sides, and there is a tense silence as they prepare weapons and harden their nerves. Suddenly, the silence is broken by the cries of their commanders: "Fire!"

Clouds of white smoke puff into the sky as cannon roar and rifles pop and crackle. Crowds of men, sometimes numbering in the thousands, rush at each other to clash on the field of battle. Many fall to the ground before reaching their enemy, clutching at their chests or stomachs as they scream in pain. As the armies clash, they struggle until one side destroys the other. The battle rages all day, littering the ground with bodies. Then photographers come to take pictures of the fallen men, medics come to search for those who might still survive, and looters come searching for valuables to steal from the helpless.

Unlike most battles, though, this kind always has a happy ending. When the day ends, the men on both sides stand up, congratulate each other, and often go out to have a meal and beer together. And although much video footage is taken, it's not a movie set. Welcome to the world of the Civil War battle reenactment. It's a hobby that has gained much popularity in recent years. Across the country there are hundreds of clubs that organize reenactments of the many battles that took place during the Civil War. Some are small, with only a few dozen members. Others are very large. The largest is the one that reenacts the most famous clash of the war: the battle of Gettysburg.

Of the many wars and battles that are reenacted, the Civil War is by far the most popular. It holds a special fascination for American history buffs — an even greater fascination than with the Revolutionary War, which gave birth to the nation. This may be because it is more accessible. More pictures, documents and artifacts are available from the Civil War. It may also be because the Civil War helped define the nation and determine its future course. Some reenactors are so serious that they refuse to wear uniforms made with modern sewing machines, or equipped with zippers. Others are content to wear polyester, or comfortable blue jeans. They all share a common desire to relive a period of history in which their nation's fate hung in the balance.
